Mr Magazzeni will address the increased recognition by the United Nations, including OHCHR, as well as the international human rights mechanisms of the centrality of parliaments in the protection and promotion of human rights at the national level. He will also address how this recognition has led to increased UN engagement with parliaments and their members, and to the promotion of cooperation between parliaments and other national stakeholders, such as National Human Rights Institutions.
